Sociology GCSE at WHS

Sociology is the study of society and the people within it. If you have ever wondered why groups behave the way they do and why certain cultures occur;



whether society is fair and what can be done to change it and how society has changed over time then sociology is for you! We look at cultures in the UK as

well as around the globe to understand our world better.

Highlights of the course

- We get to dissect controversial topics like racism, sexism and classism (to name a few 'isms'!)
- We explore issues facing young people today - inequality in society, whether the education system is fair, family dynamics and roles in the home and whether people's class, age, ethnicity and gender impact criminal and deviant behaviour
- In the summer term you'll get to be a social scientist and conduct your own research project

Course content

- Our course consists of 5 main units, as well as an introduction to sociology:
 - 1. Sociology of Families
 - 2. Sociology of Education
 - 3. Social Stratification
 - 4. Crime and Deviance
 - 5. Research Methods

 This course is 100% exam based; there is no coursework
