

Woodbridge High School GCSE Religious Studies

Welcome to Woodbridge High Schools RE department. GCSE Religious Studies is designed to enable learners to develop their interest and enthusiasm for, a study of religion and its place in the wider world. The course allows students to explore 2 religions in depth whilst also studying the philosophical approaches taken to understand the place of religion within the world and how religion forms ethical opinions and informs morals.

What do you cover in the course? The OCR GCSE course is made up of 3 components. These components are based on the study of religion, philosophy and ethics.



Year 9 – In year 9 students are given a chance to get to grips with GCSE RE within lessons many engaging and interesting discussions and debates take place all relating back to religion, philosophy and ethics. Some of the topics covered include role of men and women, new religious movements, crime and punishment, the sociology of religion, pluralism, ecumenicalism, theology, medical ethics and many other topic areas. This is all to prepare students on covering the GCSE content.

Year 10/Religion: Christianity and Islam – This component focuses on the beliefs, teachings and practices of two religions (Islam and Christianity). This part of the course allows for philosophical and theological study, discussion and debate. Students are given opportunities to reflect upon other world religions. This component will be examined through a 2 hour exam.

1. Christianity – Beliefs and Teachings
2. Christianity – Practices
3. Islam – Beliefs and Teachings
4. Islam – Practices

Some of the topics discussed and studied in RE include Euthanasia, genetic engineering, arguments in favour and against God, Scientific theories on creation, secularisation, Pacifism, war, terrorism, pluralism, cloning, situation ethics

Year 10/Philosophy and Ethics – In this part of the course students will be given opportunities to study philosophical beliefs, theories and views alongside ethical issues and take a look at how religions respond to these ethical issues. Students will be given opportunities to partake in debates and discussions. Students will also look at the philosophical, sociological, psychological impacts these issues have on the world. This component will be examined through a 2hour exam.

1. Relationships and families
2. The existence of God
3. Religion, peace and conflict
4. Dialogue within and between religions and non-religious beliefs.
