What will I do in lessons?

You will continue to build on the German language skills that you already gained in school. We put a strong emphasis on developing your spontaneity, complexity and accuracy in the language, as well as your comprehension abilities, as these are skills needed for both the GCSE examination and for using the language in real-life. You will also be given lots of opportunities to practise the four skills required for the exam, in addition to lots of activities designed to help you acquire, practise and consolidate vocabulary and grammar.

A key aspect of learning a language, regardless of whether you are preparing for an examination or not, is independent work. To this aim, you will complete independent work using interactive online vocabulary resources such as Memrise or Quizlet as well as completing a range of independent home-learning activities to practise and consolidate the skills and knowledge learnt in lessons.



Can I really use German in the future?

Of course! There are a wide range of job opportunities with German in a huge range of careers. Just search using *German* as a keyword on a recruitment site and you will see a range of jobs in diverse areas as accounting, finance, science, technology, law, marketing and sales. In fact, whatever career you are planning on, knowledge of German will be a huge asset! According to a recent survey, German has become one of the most sought- after languages by employers. Job vacancies specifying German language skills as a requirement rose by 11.6% over the past three years.

Studying German at GCSE will also make you stand out when you apply to universities. Due to the fact that fewer students nationally in state comprehensive secondary schools obtain a GCSE in German, this qualification could now be worth even more to you as it has scarcity value.
