Frequently Asked Questions

Q When does the Sixth Form application form have to be submitted?

A The deadline for the form is Monday 12th January 2026 for Woodbridge students and Monday 16th February 2026 for external students.

Q When will Woodbridge students receive their mock results and predicted grades?

A They will receive these on Thursday 11th December 2025.

Q Will I be able to change my choices if my predicted grades are better or worse than I expected?

A Yes. Woodbridge students will be able to change their choices at a guidance meeting in the Spring term. If you have chosen courses for which you do not have the predicted grades, then we will talk to you about alternatives.

Q What if I am predicted to get fewer than 50 points? Will I be able to choose A Levels?

A If you are a Woodbridge student, we will discuss this with you on an individual basis at your guidance meeting. If you think you will be close to the points score you need, then you should apply for the course and we will make a decision based on how likely we think it is that you will get the score you need in the final exams.

Q What if I do better than predicted in my final exams? Can I move to a different course than the one I was offered?

A Yes, you can always change your choices after the exam results as long as your new choices fit in with the timetable and there are spaces available on those courses. You can make changes to the enrolment application form that you will be sent on results day.

Q Can parents of Woodbridge students attend the guidance meeting?

A Most guidance meetings are straightforward and only last a few minutes. For example, they know what they want to do and have the predicted points score to do it. If the situation is more complex, we may contact parents to involve them. Q Can I change to a different course after the start of Sixth Form, for example if I start a VTQ or AAQ course and realise that I want to do A Levels?

A If you have the points score you need, then you can change courses on enrolment day or within the first few weeks. After that, students will have missed too much content to change course.

Q Why are the courses arranged in blocks? Does that mean I can't do two subjects in the same block?

A We have allocated subjects into five blocks. The blocks enable students to select the most popular combinations of subjects. However, there will be some combinations that are not possible. For example, two subjects in the same block that do not have classes in other blocks. We can't promise, but we will try to work with you to find a solution. There is a section on the application form to note down problems like this.
